18. Given the current mission, major programs, and major operational objectives of the department/agency to which you have been nominated, what in your background or employment experience do you believe affirmatively qualifies you for appointment to the position for which you have been nominated, and why do you wish to serve in that position?

I have served as a Coast Guard officer for nearly 30 years (with four additional years as a cadet at the Coast Guard Academy). During my career, I have had a number of operational assignments, including command of two Coast Guard cutters, as well as demanding legal staff assignments. I was Director of Joint Interagency Task Force South with responsibility for the detection and monitoring of illicit traffic throughout the western hemisphere and beyond. The Task Force was comprised of members from all five armed services (including the National Guard and Reserve), most of the federal law enforcement agencies, nearly all the members of the Intelligence Community, and representatives from over 15 foreign countries' law enforcement and military establishments. I have supervised a legal staff of over 25 Coast Guard attorneys, both officers and civilians. I have participated in extensive Coast Guard ground level operations at sea and ashore. I have supported the operations of the Coast Guard as a judge advocate in both the domestic and international realms. In addition, I was assigned as Legislative Counsel for Coast Guard Congressional Affairs for three years. During that time, I participated in the development and assisted in the enactment of the Maritime Transportation Security Act of 2003, the most comprehensive port security legislation in many decades, as well as the Homeland Security Act of 2003, which transferred the Coast Guard to the newly created Department of Homeland Security. I have also ably served in a flag officer capacity as the Assistant Commandant for Governmental and Public Affairs, Military Advisor to the Secretary of Homeland Security, Deputy Commander, Coast Guard Atlantic Area, and in my current position as Deputy Commandant for Operations. I believe that these experiences, as well as my success at filling these demanding positions, have prepared me exceptionally well to be the Vice Commandant of the Coast Guard. I greatly desire to employ my skills to continue to serve the Coast Guard and the American people.

19. What do you believe are your responsibilities, if confirmed, to ensure that the department/agency has proper management and accounting controls, and what experience do you have in managing a large organization?

As a judge advocate, I have been involved throughout my career in providing oversight to many aspects of the Coast Guard. One of my primary responsibilities has been to ensure that all Coast Guard proposals and operations under my cognizance comply with all Federal laws and regulations, as well as Coast Guard policies. To accomplish this, each item undergoes an intensive legal sufficiency review. Only when the item has been carefully scrubbed will it gain my stamp of approval. I will continue to aggressively

provide oversight to ensure compliance and will strive to ensure that taxpayers' interests are well served. As Deputy Commandant for Operations, I am responsible for establishing and providing operational strategy, policy, guidance, and resources for global Coast Guard operations. As Deputy Commander, Coast Guard Atlantic Area, I was second in command of over 20,000 Coast Guard personnel distributed over an area spanning from the Rocky Mountains to the Arabian Gulf. As Director of JLATF South, I commanded over 600 personnel with responsibilities throughout the western hemisphere and beyond. I have commanded two Coast Guard cutters with my largest afloat command being 75 personnel. I have supervised a staff of over 25 Coast Guard attorneys, both officers and civilians. I have been involved in direct leadership of personnel across the spectrum of experience and education throughout my Coast Guard career.

20. What do you believe to be the top three challenges facing the department/agency, and why?

I believe the Coast Guard's three largest current challenges are:

1. Mission execution in a constrained resource environment – The Coast Guard is a multi-mission agency that has a broad range of responsibilities in the maritime environment. Achieving the right balance of emphasis for those missions in a world of limited resources and constantly changing threats is, in my opinion, the service's largest challenge. Since 9/11/01, the Coast Guard has been pressed to fulfill expanded security responsibilities while still performing traditional missions like drug and fisheries law enforcement, marine safety, and search and rescue. In addition, emerging areas such as cyber, the Arctic, and the energy renaissance will challenge the Coast Guard. Striking the right balance for investment of Coast Guard effort is, and will remain, a constant challenge that will require precise monitoring and regular adjustments.
2. Vessel and aircraft recapitalization – Having served on several aging Coast Guard cutters (my most recent command (departed in 2006) was USCGC RESOLUTE a 210' medium endurance cutter commissioned in 1966), the Coast Guard needs new equipment in order to carry out our many offshore missions. Critical portions of our fleet, most specifically the 210 and 270 foot medium endurance cutters, are old and we expend too many resources on a fleet that is rapidly becoming obsolete. While new vessels and aircraft are coming on line, the men and women of our cutter and aviation fleets deserve capable and modern equipment to counter the many threats facing our Nation and the taxpayers deserve the best value proposition available.
3. Sexual Assault – The Coast Guard must take the issue of sexual assault head on. The Commandant has declared this to be an "all hands" evolution and I will do everything in my power to eliminate this devastating scourge from our service. I have spent my entire career dealing with this and other criminal misconduct as a prosecutor, commander, leader, and attorney. The effort spearheaded by the Coast Guard Military Campaign Office (MCO) is on the right track by aggressively attacking this matter along four lines of effort – climate, prevention, response, and accountability. I will not cease my efforts until sexual assault is driven from the Coast Guard.

From 2001 to 2004, I was assigned as Legislative Counsel for Coast Guard Congressional Affairs. During this time, I represented and advocated for cleared administration positions on pending legislation and maintained an active dialogue with Congressional staffs and, occasionally, Members of Congress. These years were very active for major legislation impacting the Coast Guard, including the groundbreaking Maritime Transportation Security Act of 2003, and the Homeland Security Act of 2003, which transferred the Coast Guard to the newly created Department of Homeland Security. I also advocated for administration positions on a full range of other maritime legislation including environmental protection bills, law enforcement bills, and other legislation relevant to the Coast Guard. As Chief of the Office of Maritime and International Law, I was invited on several occasions to brief Members of Congress and Congressional staffs on such matters as the pending Coast Guard Authorization bill, the proposed accession to the Law of the Sea Convention, and various environmental protection and law enforcement measures. All my advocacy was in support of cleared administration positions. I have also actively participated in preparing Coast Guard witnesses for Congressional hearings and briefers for Congressional Members and staffs concerning matters within the cognizance of the Coast Guard.

6. Explain how you will resolve any potential conflict of interest, including any that may be disclosed by your responses to the above items. I do not believe that I have any outstanding conflicts of interest. But, in such situations, I will obtain advice from a Coast Guard ethics official and follow that advice.

C. LEGAL MATTERS

1. Have you ever been disciplined or cited for a breach of ethics by, or been the subject of a complaint to any court, administrative agency, professional association, disciplinary committee, or other professional group? If so, please explain.

On March 5, 2008, correspondence sent to the Department of Homeland Security Inspector General was provided to the Coast Guard for action it deemed appropriate. The Coast Guard reviewed the communication and determined that I committed no misconduct and that no further action was required.

Captain Pat Neher, my Navy counterpart, and I participated in a teleconference ("Bloggers Roundtable") sponsored by the Department of Defense on December 10, 2007. The purpose of this teleconference was to advance the Administration's position that the United States should ratify the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS). My participation accorded with the direction of the Judge Advocate General and the Commandant to vigorously advocate ratification.

An e-mail advised the Inspector General hotline of a report concerning comments made by me about UNCLOS in the context of a controversy over whether a liquefied natural gas (LNG) terminal should be built in northern Maine. The e-mail and an included letter to the Commandant objected to my comments.

The Canadian Government refused to assent to the innocent passage of LNG tankers through Canadian waters to reach the proposed site of the terminal. The United States has formally protested that this position violates UNCLOS. I cited this issue to show that UNCLOS provides important navigational rights for vessels serving U.S. ports through foreign waters and to demonstrate these rights have commercial and economic impacts. The correspondence attempted to link my comments to the decision whether to permit the LNG terminal. I expressed no position on the siting or permitting of the terminal and my remarks were confined to repeating the position of the United States concerning innocent passage.

My comments were deemed consistent with my duties and proper and the Coast Guard took no further action.




