Since 1986, I have had the privilege to serve in the most demanding and rewarding operational, command, and senior staff level assignments in the Coast Guard, the Department of Homeland Security, and the Department of Defense. The entirety of these experiences have provided me with a deep understanding and ability to address complex maritime challenges. Furthermore, I have been assigned to numerous locations around our country tasked with leading and taking care of a highly talented workforce charged with promoting, defending and protecting Coast Guard, homeland and national security interests. My 35-year diverse Coast Guard background, numerous years of leadership experience, and proven track record of performance have created an exceptionally strong foundation for me to serve at the senior executive level of our service and government. I am extremely passionate and proud of the tremendous value the Coast Guard provides to our country. I'm humbled and thankful for the opportunity to continue serving and strive to make the Coast Guard the preeminent global leader in maritime rescue and contingency response so that the Department of Homeland Security remains aggressively postured, ready, and capable to meet all current and future domestic and international threats and challenges.

23. What do you believe are your responsibilities, if confirmed, to ensure that the Coast Guard has proper management and accounting controls, and what experience do you have in managing a large organization?

If confirmed, it will be my ultimate duty and responsibility to ensure the Coast Guard workforce performs to the absolute highest standards of integrity and moral principles. As a model organization of ethical managers and watchful stewards of public resources and trust, I pledge to continually strengthen the Coast Guard's unwavering commitment to administer the American taxpayer's dollars as efficiently and judiciously as possible.

(2022-Present) As the United States Cyber Command J-7, Director of Force Development, I have successfully led a 165+ high performing, high impact military, government, and contractor cyberspace workforce. With Joint Force Trainer responsibilities, my team and I have been instrumental in driving U.S. Cyber Command readiness by ensuring first class delivery of individual training across Defense Cyber Operations work roles. In addition, my team has developed, planned, and executed numerous strategic, operational, and tactical cyberspace exercises and wargames in support of U.S. Cyber Command, the eleven U.S. Combatant Commands, the inter-agency, and our international partners with a focus on the European and Indo-Pacific threats. Moreover, my team has developed, maintained, and provided high level governance over the nation's premier multi-million dollar Persistent Cyber Training Environment capability ensuring our cyber warfighters have the right training infrastructure and tools to reach qualifications and work role proficiency.

(2019-2021) As the Coast Guard Eleventh District Chief of Staff, I was the principal advisor to the District Commander and second in Command of an extremely demanding 3.3 million square mile, 4-state (CA, AZ, NV, UT) district and Eastern Pacific international counter-drug operations covering 10 partner nations. I led a 183 member district staff comprised of 9 Divisions, and a joint District Eleven-Pacific Area Command Operations Center. Additionally, I provided executive oversight of a 5600 plus Active Duty, Reserve, Civilian, and Auxiliary workforce, 4 Sector Commands, 5 Air Stations with multiple H-65, H-60, C-27 aircraft, 19 Coast Guard cutters (comprised of 87 Coastal Patrol Boats, Fast Response Cutters, 2 large Buoy Tender cutters), and 14 small boat stations. This pinnacle leadership position allowed me to develop and provide strategic and tactical level guidance to both staff members and operational units which gave me an exceptional breadth of involvement across the entire range of Coast Guard missions combined with the real world application of managing and executing a multimillion dollar annual budget.

(2016-2019) As Sector Commander, Captain of the Port, Search and Rescue Mission Coordinator, Officer-in-Charge of Marine Inspections, Federal Maritime Security Coordinator, Federal On-scene Commander, and Air Station Commanding Officer of the San Diego region, I was entrusted with statutory authorities and responsible for the safety and security of the largest naval port in the Pacific directing Coast Guard missions and inter-agency operations in the southwest coastal and offshore corridor of the United States. I led a 450 member workforce and over 600 Coast Guard Auxiliarist on a major Coast Guard installation with 26 facilities including an inter-agency Joint Harbor Operations Center, three 87-foot Coastal Patrol Boats, three MH-60 multi-mission helicopters, an Aids to Navigation Team, and a Small Boat Station. With these assets, I also provided executive oversight of the international Maritime Boundary Line to disrupt Transnational Criminal Organizations. To this end, I was responsible for ensuring the responsible management, safeguarding, and execution of a multi-million dollar operating budget and federal property.

24. What do you believe to be the top three challenges facing the Coast Guard, and why?

a. "National and global demand on the Coast Guard." The demands on the Coast Guard today and tomorrow are very different than when I joined over three decades ago. The global rules-based order is challenged on a daily basis, and the United States and our allies' Maritime Critical Infrastructure is under constant cyberspace threat, and demand for more Coast Guard presence in the Indo-Pacific places the Coast Guard as an increasingly critical and non-duplicated bridge between the Department of State's diplomacy and the Department of Defense's lethality. The Coast Guard is the right tool to set and model norms where able and confront the competition of our adversaries. But this increasingly national relevance does pose a challenge for the Service as it works to balance these growing demands abroad with the relentless domestic impacts of climate change, persistent cyberspace protection of our Maritime Transportation System, and other threats to our coasts.

b. "Large-scale surges." More storms at home are driving more frequent full-scale Coast Guard mobilizations that severely tests our ability to protect the American people. Contingency response has always been the Coast Guard's marquee mission capability. In addition to our 11 statutory missions, our Service carries the three basic roles of Maritime Safety, Security, and Stewardship. Additionally, we are the coastal defense, search and rescue, and maritime law enforcement branch of the United States Armed Forces. Increases in frequency and intensity of hurricanes, wildfires, storms, and amplified tidal forces along with non-traditional mission response (i.e. land border support), the deadly fentanyl crisis, and increasing global threats challenges the Coast Guard to develop a sustainable surge capacity that can respond to contingencies and crisis on multiple fronts ensuring the service will continue to be Semper Paratus (Always Ready) to respond, protect and safeguard the American public.

c. "Ready now and tomorrow." The Coast Guard is an incredibly adaptive and agile organization. Our adaptable culture creates a workforce and delivers capabilities that are flexible and scalable. Our platforms are multimission and our workforce is, too. But geopolitical, social, and technological drivers are quickly changing our operating environment. For instance - rapid adoption of technology is changing the way our domestic Maritime Transportation System and global shipping operate. The ability of Coast Guard regulatory oversight to keep pace with industry adoption of technology is a major challenge; especially with automation in the Maritime Transportation System that requires protection against cyberspace adversaries. Moreover, offshore commerce shipping and growth in the commercial offshore space industry will drive additional Coast Guard maritime responsibilities and demand. To prepare for tomorrow, the Coast Guard must continually evaluate and improve the way we recruit and manage talent. And I believe that an inclusive, diverse workforce is a force multiplier needed to meet future emerging demands on the service. One potential challenge of concern is how the blended retirement system may create a retention problem during a time of historic recruiting shortfalls. The challenge is striking the right balance between a Coast Guard that is fully ready to keep faith with the American people today while also preparing for a rapidly changing future.

In 2010, when I was the Aviation Operations Officer at Air Station San Francisco, a subordinate officer filed an Article 138 complaint against the Commanding Officer. In response to the complaint, the District Commander initiated an investigation into the command climate at the unit. I was interviewed as a witness during that investigation. While I was not provided a copy of the Article 138 complaint itself, I surmised from the questions that the subordinate officer had made statements within it taking issue with my own leadership, as well as that of the Commanding Officer and Executive Officer. I was later informed that the investigation did not reveal wrongdoing by the Command and that the unit climate was healthy.

RDML Joseph Buzzella currently serves as the J-7 Director of Exercises and Training, United States Cyber Command. In this role, he enables cyber domain warfighting readiness and superiority through leading the Command's Joint Force Development mission to ensure collective and individual cyberspace training in response to national defense and operational priorities.

RDML Buzzella previously served as the Chief, Coast Guard Office of Emerging Policy (DCO-X) from 2021-22. In this role, he led a high performing team in developing, synchronizing, and articulating emerging policy to further the Coast Guard strategic vision.



RDML Buzzella completed Coast Guard Enlisted Basic Training at Cape May, New Jersey in 1986 after serving in recruit company Bravo 123. After boot camp, he was assigned to Coast Guard Base Miami Beach as a Coast Guard Reservist. He is a 1988 graduate of the Naval Academy Preparatory School (NAPS) and a 1992 graduate of the Coast Guard Academy where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Management and a Coast Guard officer commission. Following graduation, RDML Buzzella served as a Deck Watch Officer aboard the USCGC Spencer and USCGC Vindicator. Upon completion of U.S. Naval Flight Training in Pensacola, Florida, he was designated Naval Aviator 23,901 and Coast Guard Aviator 3,293 in 1996.

He then reported to Coast Guard Air Station Miami, Florida where he flew the HH-65 Dauphin Helicopter and later the HU-25 Falcon Jet where he maintained dual airframe qualifications. In 2000, he was assigned to Coast Guard Air Station Cape Cod, Massachusetts where he flew HU-25 Falcon Jets. In 2005, he was assigned under the Department of Homeland Security Chief Financial Officer in Washington D.C., where he served as an Assistant Director and Budget Program Reviewer providing oversight of more than \$26 billion in annual appropriations. In 2007, he reported to Coast Guard Air Station San Francisco, California where he held the positions of Operations Officer and Executive Officer and flew the MH-65 Helicopter. In 2011, he was assigned as Commanding Officer of Coast Guard Air Station Traverse City, Michigan where he flew the MH-65 Helicopter. In 2014, RDML Buzzella reported to the Pentagon as Special Assistant to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and Deputy Director of the Chairman's Action Group (CAG) under General Martin Dempsey, USA and General Joseph Dunford, USMC.
