18. Given the current mission, major programs, and major operational objectives of the department/agency to which you have been nominated, what in your background or employment experience do you believe affirmatively qualifies you for appointment to the position for which you have been nominated, and why do you wish to serve in that position?

I am a career Coast Guard officer with 32 years active duty service. I have benefited from a great diversity of assignments and leadership opportunities that I believe have prepared me to take on greater levels of responsibility. I have a strong operational foundation with three tours of duty onboard Coast Guard cutters engaged in law enforcement, migrant interdiction, search and rescue, and fisheries, and three tours of duty in "shore" operations, supervising Coast Guard stations, small cutters, aviation operations, marine investigations and inspections, pollution response and other ports and waterways missions. Most of my operational time has been in command positions, fully accountable for the conduct and outcome of assigned missions. This operational experience allows me to understand the complex mission support needs of the Coast Guard. I also have diverse support and resource management experience with assignments in civil engineering, acquisition, budgeting and program review, human resources, and executive support. As a flag officer, I have served as the Coast Guard's

Strategy Director, as the Deputy Director for Operations at the U.S. Northern Command, and as the Commander of the Seventeenth Coast Guard District overseeing all Coast Guard operations in Alaska, including responsibility for extensive international partnerships in the North Pacific and Arctic regions. With these experiences, I have demonstrated success in balancing amongst the Coast Guard's multiple mission demands, between operations and enabling support activities, and between current operations and investment in future capabilities. I believe these experiences have prepared me exceptionally well to be the Deputy Commandant for Mission Support, and to continue to serve the Coast Guard, the Department of Homeland Security, and the American people.

19. What do you believe are your responsibilities, if confirmed, to ensure that the department/agency has proper management and accounting controls, and what experience do you have in managing a large organization?

As a Coast Guard senior leader, I have a duty as a steward of taxpayer dollars and public trust to manage resources effectively and direct our limited resources to greatest operational effect. This requires strict controls to ensure valid mission requirements, prevent waste, fraud and abuse and create reliable financial reporting. If confirmed for this position, I will have oversight over the Coast Guard's acquisition, sustainment and human resource programs, all of which require effective management and accounting controls. I will ensure the appropriate systems are in place to provide measurable performance, accountability, and full auditability. With experience in operations, engineering, budgeting, acquisition and strategy, I have been able to successfully manage large organizations (up to 1,500 people spread over thousands of miles) in a manner that demonstrates proper stewardship of public resources. As the Executive Director for the Deputy Commandant for Mission Support and Executive Assistant to the Vice Commandant and Senior Acquisition Official, I was involved in the Coast Guard's attainment of a clean audit opinion, and as a senior operational commander I have been involved in the critical role of sustaining that audit success.

20. What do you believe to be the top three challenges facing the department/agency, and why?

While the Coast Guard benefits from having outstanding and high performing active duty, reserve, civilian and auxiliary members, we face significant challenges in the future with maintaining the capabilities of our workforce. Those challenges include attracting and retaining top talent from all segments of society in a highly competitive environment, maintaining technical skills to deal with a rapidly changing maritime environment, and developing the next generation of Coast Guard, DHS and interagency leaders who can deliver continuous organizational improvement in a collaborative environment. Continued pressure on operating expense accounts makes these challenges particularly complex; we will need to strike the right balance between recapitalizing and sustaining our materiel assets and investing in improvements in our workforce, and we will need to create more responsive and adaptable personnel policies and practices to keep up with the pace of change. We exist to perform missions for the maritime public and we take pride in being the world's best coast guard; personnel well-being and proficiency to support mission excellence should continue to be a primary area of organizational focus.

As a senior operational commander, every day I face the challenges of maintaining an aging fleet (including ships, aircraft, shore infrastructure and other capital assets), while employing new capabilities such as National Security Cutters, Fast Response Cutters, and C-130 "J" models, all being delivered to the field over the coming years. Balancing today's Coast Guard performance with the need for investment in the future has never been more challenging. We must make today's operations as efficient as possible using risk-based decision-making, maximizing the use of partnerships (public, private, international, etc.), and improving business processes. At the same time, we must ensure that our acquisition programs for future capability are cost effective, fully justified and adaptable to changing mission needs for an uncertain future.

We cannot take for granted the Coast Guard's ability to mobilize for significant events, such as the responses to Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria last year. I've experienced first-hand the challenges we faced in responding to the terrorist attacks on 9/11 in New York City, in the Deepwater Horizon oil spill, or that we will face at some point in responding to a mass rescue event or oil spill in opening U.S. Arctic waters. While we have a number of programs in place to ensure our

people are skilled in emergency response, we have no forces in garrison nor do we have the full capabilities or capacities needed to meet rising public expectations for government responsiveness in major contingencies. We will need to act on the lessons learned from recent events to further improve our response capabilities, including investments in our Reserve forces, expansion of our partnerships with local, state, federal, tribal, international and industry organizations, and the continued acquisition of multi-mission, adaptable capability that we are building into cutters, aircraft, C4IT systems, infrastructure and deployable forces.




# Rear Admiral Michael F. McAllister

# Commander, 17th Coast Guard District U.S. Coast Guard



Rear Admiral Michael F. McAllister assumed the duties of Commander, Seventeenth Coast Guard District in June 2016. He is responsible for Coast Guard operations throughout Alaska, which include protecting life and property, enforcing federal laws and treaties, preserving living marine resources and promoting national security. The Coast Guard's forces in Alaska total more than 2,500 active duty, reserve, civilian and auxiliary personnel, who employ 15 cutters, 52 boats, and 17 aircraft across an area of responsibility that includes the North Pacific Ocean, Arctic Ocean and Bering Sea. Headquartered in Juneau, the District Commander provides operationally ready maritime forces to Coast Guard and Department of Defense Commanders for Coast Guard, joint, and interagency operations both domestically and internationally.





Admiral McAllister has served in a variety of operational assignments, both afloat and ashore. He served as a Deck Watch Officer aboard the USCGC STEADFAST, St. Petersburg, Florida, and as Commanding Officer of USCGC POINT STEELE, Fort Myers Beach, Florida and USCGC KEY LARGO, Savannah, Georgia. From 2000 to 2003, Admiral McAllister served as Chief, Response Division at Coast Guard Activities New York where he led maritime response and security operations following the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001 in New York City. He also served as Commander of Coast Guard Sector Charleston, South Carolina where he oversaw all Coast Guard missions in the states of South Carolina and Georgia and prototyped the Department of Homeland Security's successful Interagency Operations Center Program.

Admiral McAllister's staff assignments include duty as a Construction Project Manager at Facilities Design and Construction Center Pacific in Seattle, Washington and as Executive Officer of Civil Engineering Unit Miami, Florida. He served as a program reviewer in the Office of Programs and Budget at Coast Guard Headquarters in Washington, DC, and the Officer Assignments Branch Chief at the Coast Guard Personnel Command, Arlington, Virginia. He was also the Executive Assistant to the Vice Commandant of the Coast Guard, the Executive Director for the Deputy Commandant for Mission Support, and the Director of Coast Guard Enterprise Strategic Management and Doctrine.

Admiral McAllister attended the United States Coast Guard Academy, graduating in 1986 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering. In 1991, he was awarded a Master of Science Degree in Civil Engineering from the University of Illinois at Champaign-Urbana. In 2004, he received a Masters of Business Administration from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology as a member of the Sloan Fellows Program. His personal awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit (four awards), the Meritorious Service Medal (five awards), the Coast Guard Commendation Medal (three awards), the DOT 9/11 Medal, as well as numerous other personal, unit and Service awards.
