3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Small Business Artifi-
- 5 cial Intelligence Training and Toolkit Act of 2024".

6 SEC. 2. ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE TRAINING RESOURCES

- 7 AND TOOLKITS FOR SMALL BUSINESS CON8 CERNS.
- 9 (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

1	(1) Appropriate committees of con-
2	GRESS.—The term "appropriate committees of Con-
3	gress" means—
4	(A) the Committee on Commerce, Science,
5	and Transportation and the Committee on
6	Small Business and Entrepreneurship of the
7	Senate; and
8	(B) the Committee on Science, Space, and
9	Technology and the Committee on Small Busi-
10	ness of the House of Representatives.
11	(2) ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE.—The term "ar-
12	tificial intelligence" has the meaning given such
13	term in section 5002 of the William M. (Mac)
14	Thornberry National Defense Authorization Act for
15	Fiscal Year 2021 (15 U.S.C. 9401).
16	(3) CENTER.—The term "Center" has the
17	meaning given such term in section 25(a) of the Na-
18	tional Institute of Standards and Technology Act
19	(15 U.S.C. 278k(a)).
20	(4) DIRECTOR.—The term "Director" means
21	the Director of the National Institute of Standards
22	and Technology.
23	(5) Hollings manufacturing extension
24	PARTNERSHIP.—The term "Hollings Manufacturing
25	Extension Partnership" has the meaning given such

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1	term in section 25(a) of the National Institute of
2	Standards and Technology Act (15 U.S.C. 278k(a)).
3	(6) INDIAN TRIBE.—The term "Indian Tribe"
4	has the meaning given the term in section 4 of the
5	Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance
6	Act (25 U.S.C. 5304).
7	(7) Key emerging technologies.—The term
8	"key emerging technologies" means the technologies
9	included in the initial list of key technology focus
10	areas set forth by section 10387(c) of the Research
11	and Development, Competition, and Innovation Act
12	(42 U.S.C. 19107(c)), photonics, and electronics.
13	(8) RURAL COMMUNITY.—The term "rural
14	community" means a community that is located in
15	areas that are not classified as urban by the Bureau
16	of the Census.
17	(9) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
18	the Secretary of Commerce.
19	(10) Small business concern.—The term
20	"small business concern" has the meaning given
21	such term in section 3(a) of the Small Business Act
22	(15 U.S.C. 632(a)).
23	(b) DEVELOPMENT OF TRAINING RESOURCES AND
24	Toolkits Required.—

1 (1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 1 year after 2 the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary 3 shall, acting through the Director, the Hollings 4 Manufacturing Extension Partnership, and the Cen-5 ters and in consultation and coordination with the 6 Administrator of the Small Business Administration, 7 the Secretary of Agriculture, and such persons in 8 the private sector as the Secretary of Commerce con-9 siders appropriate, develop training resources and 10 toolkits for small business concerns, including small 11 business concerns located in rural, Tribal, or under-12 served communities or involved in advanced manu-13 facturing, relating to the adoption and use of artifi-14 cial intelligence and such other key emerging tech-15 nologies, such as quantum-hybrid computing, as the 16 Secretary considers appropriate.

17 (2) CONTENTS.—The training and toolkits de-18 veloped under paragraph (1) shall include prompt 19 engineering and the use of artificial intelligence or 20 emerging technologies, such as quantum hybrid 21 tools, relating to access to credit and capital, finan-22 cial management and accounting, business planning 23 and operations, cybersecurity, marketing, supply 24 chain management, government contracting, and ex-25 porting.

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(c) REVIEW AND UPDATE OF TRAINING RESOURCES
 AND TOOLKITS.—Not later than 2 years after the date
 of the enactment of this Act, and not less frequently than
 once every 2 years thereafter, the Secretary shall—

5 (1) review the training resources and toolkits6 developed pursuant to subsection (b); and

7 (2) update such resources and toolkits as the8 Secretary considers appropriate.

9 (d) DISTRIBUTION AND USE OF TRAINING RE-10 SOURCES AND TOOLKITS.—The Secretary shall coordinate with the Administrator of the Small Business Administra-11 tion on the distribution and use of the training resources 12 13 and toolkits that are developed pursuant to subsection (b) through the resource partners of the Small Business Ad-14 15 ministration, including small business development centers, women business centers, SCORE, veteran business 16 17 opportunity centers, and the Apex Accelerator.

18 (e) GRANTS PROGRAM.—

(1) AUTHORITY.—The Secretary may carry out
a program on the award of grants to persons providing training relating to artificial intelligence to
small business concerns using the training resources
developed under subsection (b).

(2) GIFT AUTHORITY.—The Secretary may re ceive gifts that the Secretary shall use to carry out
 paragraph (1).

4 (f) Reports to Congress.—

5 (1) INITIAL REPORT.—Not later than 1 year
6 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec7 retary shall submit to the appropriate committees of
8 Congress a report on the development, distribution,
9 and use of the training resources and toolkits devel10 oped pursuant to subsection (b).

11 (2) BIENNIAL REPORTS.—

12 (A) REPORTS REQUIRED.—Not later than 13 3 years after the date of the enactment of this 14 Act, and not less frequently than once every 2 15 years thereafter, the Secretary shall submit to 16 appropriate committees of Congress a biennial 17 report on the development, distribution, and use 18 of training resources and toolkits developed 19 pursuant to subsection (b).

20 (B) CONTENTS.—Each report submitted to
21 subparagraph (A) shall include, for the period
22 of covered by the report, the following:

23 (i) A list of the training resources and
24 toolkits developed pursuant to subsection
25 (b).

1	(ii) A description of the measurable
2	outcomes of the distribution of such train-
3	ing resources and toolkits, including the
4	following:
5	(I) The number and type of small
6	business concerns using such training
7	resources and toolkits.
8	(II) The effect of such use on the
9	revenues, sales, and workforces of the
10	small business concerns.
