


Given the current mission, major programs, and major operational objectives of the department/agency to which you have been nominated, what in your background or employment experience do you believe affirmatively qualifies you for appointment to the position for which you have been nominated, and why do you wish to serve in that position?

Background and experience: *Over the course of twenty-seven years, I have held progressively larger responsibility for the leadership and management of Coast Guard program management and operations. Most recently, I have served as the Chief of Staff for the Fourteenth Coast Guard District, acting for the District Commander directing the activities of subordinate commanders at two Sectors, Coast Guard Far East Activities in Japan and Singapore, an Air Station, eight Cutters, four small boat stations, and operations spanning 35 partner Pacific Island Countries and Territories. In addition to daily field command, the District Commander has used the assignment to further broaden my understanding of the role of the flag corps generally and the Department of Defense, our sister services, and the Pacific Command. Finally, my exposure to national-strategy level issues while serving at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, in Coast Guard Congressional Affairs, and twice at the Department of Homeland Security's immediate office of the Secretary/Deputy Secretary provide a foundation for my future service as a Coast Guard Admiral if confirmed.*

Devotion to Service: *I am strongly motivated to continue serving my nation. First, the missions of the Coast Guard visible in the response to Hurricane HARVEY continue to inspire me, and I am compelled to contribute whatever leadership, vision, and management I can. Second, my family and I have personally experienced the Coast Guard's duty to people, and it has inspired a deep loyalty. I am honor-bound to pay forward the countless kindnesses and the investments this great nation has made in my family and me.*

19. What do you believe are your responsibilities, if confirmed, to ensure that the department/agency has proper management and accounting controls, and what experience do you have in managing a large organization?

Management and Accounting Controls: *If confirmed to the position of Rear Admiral, I am duty-bound to deliver Americans the most effective execution of Coast Guard missions possible. I am also duty-bound to steward the precious resources of this country, protecting it from waste or inefficient expenditures. While I am aware of various statutes and executive orders requiring proper program management and accounting controls, my commitment derives from my devotion to duty and from my oath to Constitutional accountability within government.*

Management Experience: *As previously noted, I have served as a Coast Guard officer for over twenty-seven years. In that time, I've led tactical formations of every size, culminating in my current position at District Fourteen, and prior to that with Command of Coast Guard Sector Houston-Galveston with eighteen subordinate units, countless State and local partner agencies, perhaps the nation's largest regulated maritime public, and over eighteen hundred Coast Guardsmen. If confirmed to the rank of Coast Guard Rear Admiral, I will draw on these experiences daily in the execution of my duties.*

20. What do you believe to be the top three challenges facing the department/agency, and why?

The Commandant has repeatedly outlined the strategic challenges facing the agency, and I reinforce that assessment with the following in no particular order:

Completing fleet recapitalization and balancing risk within fiscal constraints. *Congress, the President, and the Secretary of Homeland Security must have a shared understanding of the risk-based trade-offs the Coast Guard makes. Our value proposition includes the ability to shift to the highest emerging risks across mission while reducing emphasis on the lesser risks when resources are limited. Communicating fully the readiness and operational impacts of these decisions remains a challenge for the Service, for a variety reasons. Positioning the Commandant to fully explain these impacts is critical, particularly as we acquire the Offshore Patrol Cutter, the proposed Polar Icebreakers, and face recapitalization of our rotary wing aviation fleet and shore infrastructure. As Arctic waters become more navigable, sea-level rises, transnational threats to the Homeland of all types continue, and destructive storms impact our shores, a shared understanding becomes ever more critical. Without it, Congress and the President are disadvantaged as they make the tough decisions our nation requires.*

Adapting operations and mission support to the cyber "big data" revolution. *The private sector is in the midst of a transformative revolution involving ubiquitous sensors, networking thru the "Internet of Things," massive increases in computing power and storage, collectively the big data revolution. The impacts are manifesting in profound changes to manufacturing, robotics, and a range of automation – possibly including autonomous self-navigating/self-operating ships, shoreline chemical manufacturing and oil refining, and port terminals. The Coast Guard is challenged to keep pace with the private sector, build the workforce necessary for this new era, and to manage the expected and unexpected consequences, including cyber*

risk (both security and mishap). The possible transformation of Coast Guard mission support through ideas like 3-D printing for frequently used Cutter parts could be an enormous advantage, but could also require retrofit redesign to maximize use of printed parts. Similar challenges and opportunities exist for Coast Guard operations, perhaps most notably in the realm of risk-based analysis/targeting for operations and in the safety, security, and environmental regulation of shipping.

Positioning the Coast Guard as the workforce of choice in an era of mobility. As the above change the Coast Guard's mission space and require ever greater analysis of operational decisions given limited resources, we are also experiencing sentinel shifts in our workforce. People are our most important resource, and as we try to recruit and retain the technically savvy, cyber-enabled, educated workforce we need, we are increasingly competing with other employers. While our compelling mission gives us a recruiting/retention advantage, our legacy military personnel system presents us with challenges. As that system modernizes through initiatives such as the Blended Retirement System, the Coast Guard will address increased opportunity for a mobile workforce to transition to the private sector with much less loss of retirement opportunity. We will also have to consider ways to surge this mobile workforce back into the Coast Guard, and to retain them on part-time, reserve, or sabbatical status, bringing the best of their experience in the private sector seamlessly back into a military environment.

Captain Brian Penoyer

Chief of Staff, Coast Guard District Fourteen

Captain Brian Penoyer has served as the Chief of Staff for the Fourteenth Coast Guard District, since June 2016. As the Chief of Staff, Captain Penoyer is the principle advisor to the District Commander on all Coast Guard missions conducted in the central and South Pacific, an operating area of over 14 million square miles. Captain Penoyer is a 2015 recipient of the Coast Guard's Type I Incident Commander qualification, a native of the Chicago area, and a proud University of Chicago graduate.

Captain Penoyer previously served as the Commander of Coast Guard Sector Houston-Galveston, where he directed all Coast Guard missions across Southeast Texas and Southwest Louisiana.

In prior assignments, Captain Penoyer served at the Center for Strategic and International Studies in the International Security Program, as the Deputy Chief of Coast Guard Congressional Affairs, where he led the Service's nationwide congressional engagement strategy, as Admiral Thad Allen's liaison in the office of the Deputy Secretary of Homeland Security during the DEEPWATER HORIZON incident, in support of Admiral Allen during the Hurricane Katrina response in Louisiana, and in support of Admiral Dan Abel during the Hurricane Sandy response in New York. A specialist in coastal operations, Captain Penoyer served at Coast Guard Sector Maryland/National Capitol Region with responsibility for the Chesapeake Bay and tributaries and at Sector Jacksonville, Florida where he formulated and led the Coast Guard's regional response to the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. In other operational assignments, he inspected foreign and U.S. merchant vessels, led oil spill response teams, and conducted investigations in Alaska during a period of multiple cruise ship groundings and significant, fatal commercial fishing vessel accidents. In his first assignment for the Coast Guard, Captain Penoyer deployed throughout Europe and the Middle East during the 1991 Gulf War.



Captain Penoyer's staff assignments include serving as the Department of Homeland Security's Chief of Contingency Planning, where he led the interagency teams revising the National Response Plan, Pandemic Influenza Response Plan, and Joint Field Office doctrine. He also served as the Coast Guard's liaison to the U.S. Department of the Interior and Coast Guard representative on the National Response Team. At Coast Guard Headquarters, Captain Penoyer formulated doctrine for marine investigations, coordinated law enforcement policy, and developed the Coast Guard's enterprise operational data system.

Captain Penoyer holds a Master of Public Policy degree from the University of Maryland. He also holds a Master of Arts in National Security and Strategic Studies from the Naval War College and is a graduate of the College of Naval Command and Staff at the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island where he received the Director's Award for Academic Excellence.

Captain Penoyer has been awarded the Legion of Merit, five Meritorious Service Medals, three Coast Guard Commendation Medals, the Department of Transportation "9-11" Medal, and several campaign medals including the Southwest Asia Service Medal. He is married to Hildi Baker of Madison, Wisconsin, a nurse and University of Chicago graduate. Together they have two daughters, Scotia and Teslin.
