3 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress	s finds the following:
4 (1) Developing a r	obust, talented, and home-
5 grown workforce, particu	larly in the fields of STEM,
6 is critical to the success	of the United States innova-
7 tion economy.	
8 (2) The United Stat	es educational system is not
9 producing a sufficient m	umber of workers with the

1	necessary STEM expertise to meet the needs of the
2	United States industry in STEM fields.
3	(3) Hands-on and experiential learning opportu-
4	nities outside of the classroom are critical for stu-
5	dent success in STEM subjects and careers, stimu-
6	lating students' interest, increasing confidence, and
7	creating motivation to pursue a related career.
8	(4) Hands-on and experiential learning opportu-
9	nities can be particularly successful in inspiring in-
10	terest in students who traditionally have been under-
11	represented in STEM fields, including girls, students
12	of color, and students from disadvantaged back-
13	grounds.
14	(5) An expansion of hands-on and experiential
15	learning programs across the United States would
16	expand the STEM workforce pipeline, developing
17	and training students for careers in STEM fields.
18	(b) Definitions.—
19	(1) ESEA TERMS.—The terms "elementary
20	school", "high school", "secondary school", and
21	"State" have the meanings given the terms in sec-
22	tion 8101 of the Elementary and Secondary Edu-
23	eation Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7801).
24	(2) ELIGIBLE NONPROFIT PROGRAM.—The
25	term "eligible nonprofit program"—

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Ţ	(A) means a nonprom program serving
2	prekindergarten, elementary school, or sec-
3	ondary school students; and
4	(B) includes a program described in sub-
5	paragraph (A) that covers the continuum of
6	education from prekindergarten through high
7	school and is available in every State.
8	(3) Director.—The term "Director" means
9	the Director of the National Science Foundation.
10	(4) STEM.—The term "STEM" means science,
11	technology, engineering, and mathematics.
12	(e) Purposes.—The purposes of this section are
13	to—
14	(1) provide effective, compelling, and engaging
15	means for teaching and reinforcing fundamental
16	STEM concepts and inspiring the youth of the
17	United States to pursue careers in STEM-related
18	fields;
19	(2) expand the STEM workforce pipeline by de-
20	veloping and training students for careers in United
21	States STEM fields; and
22	(3) broaden participation in the STEM work-
23	force by underrepresented population groups.
24	(d) Program Authorized.—

1	(1) In general.—Subject to the availability of
2	appropriations for such purposes, the Director
3	shall—
4	(A) provide grants to eligible nonprofit
5	programs for supporting hands-on learning op-
6	portunities in STEM education, including via
7	after-school activities and innovative learning
8	opportunities such as robotics competitions; and
9	(B) evaluate the impact of such hands-on
10	learning opportunities on STEM learning and
11	disseminate the results of that evaluation.
12	(2) Priority.—In awarding grants under the
13	program, the Director shall give priority to eligible
14	nonprofit programs serving students that attend ele-
15	mentary, secondary, or high schools that—
16	(A) are implementing comprehensive sup-
17	port and improvement activities or targeted
18	support and improvement activities under para-
19	graph (1) or (2) of section 1111(d) of the Ele-
20	mentary and Secondary Education Act of 1965
21	(20 U.S.C. 6311(d)); or
22	(B) serve high percentages of students who
23	are eligible for a free or reduced price lunch
24	under the Richard B. Russell National School
25	Lunch Act (42 U.S.C. 1751 et seq.) (which, in

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1	the case of a high school, may be calculated
2	using comparable data from the schools that
3	feed into the high school).
4	(e) Authorization of Appropriations.—From
5	the amounts made available to carry out section 106 under
6	section 114 for each of fiscal years 2022 through 2026,
7	the Director shall use \$25,000,000 for each such fiscal
8	year to carry out this section.
