1	(b) Types of Plans.—As applicable, such plans
2	may include, but may not be limited to, the following:
3	(1) A strategy for evacuating and providing
4	care to individuals, with consideration given to the
5	needs of persons with disabilities.
6	(2) A plan for establishing a unified command.
7	(3) A plan for frontline employees to receive ac-
8	tive shooter training.
9	(4) A schedule for regular testing of commu-
10	nications equipment used to receive emergency calls.
11	(5) An evaluation of how emergency calls placed
12	by individuals using the transportation system will
13	reach police in an expeditious manner.
14	(6) A practiced method and plan to commu-
15	nicate with individuals using the transportation sys-
16	tem.
17	(c) Report to Congress.—Not later than 180 days
18	after the date of enactment of this Act, the Assistant Sec-
19	retary shall report to the Committee on Homeland Secu-

22	on the findings from its outreach to the agencies and pro-
